

ANNEX 2: Joint Civil Society Report

Analysis of 2012 UN UPR recommendations (met/unmet)

Headline issues

The Joint Civil Society Report covers 85/132 (70%) of the United Nations recommendations from 2012, finding that:

- **4/85 (4.5%)** recommendations **had been met** by the Government (although some had recent cause for concern)
- **36/85 (42.5%)** recommendations **some action had been taken** by the Government **but not met**
- **45/85 (53%)** recommendations were **not met** by the Government

In total 81/84 (95.5%) of the 2012 UN recommendations to the UK Government were not fully met according to the submissions to BIHR provided by civil society in 2016

Of the 85 UN recommendations covered by the Civil Society report, the UK Government accepted 53/85 (62%). Of these, the Civil Society report finds:

- **4/53 (8%)** recommendations **had been met** by the Government (although some had recent cause for concern)
- **32/53 (60%)** recommendations **some action had been taken** by the Government but not met
- **7/53 (32%)** recommendations **were not met** by the Government

In total 49/53 (92%) of the 2012 UN recommendations to the UK Government that the UK Government accepted were not fully met according to the submissions to BIHR provided by civil society in 2016.
